## **Unison Prayer:**

New Testament Reading: 1 John 1: 1-2:2

1 We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— 2 this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— 3 we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. 4 We are writing these things so that our[a] joy may be complete.

## God Is Light

5 This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. 6 If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; 7 but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. 8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. 9 If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 10 If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

2 My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; 2 and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world. NRSV

Gospel Reading: John 20: 19-31

### Jesus Appears to the Disciples

19 When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. 21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." 22 When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

#### Jesus and Thomas

24 But Thomas (who was called the Twin[a]), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. 25 So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." 26 A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." 27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." 28 Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" 29 Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

## The Purpose of This Book

30 Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. 31 But these are written so that you may come to believe[b] that Jesus is the Messiah,[c] the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name. NRSV

Pastor: This is the word of God for the people of God.

Message: Thank you, Thomas!, and all the witnesses

I never get tired of reading and telling the story about Thomas after the resurrection of Jesus. I can identify with Thomas—always in the wrong place, at the wrong time, missing what others were witnessing about God's amazing power within their lives and faith. He is where we get the term: Doubting Thomas—someone who doubts in the face of others proclaiming a truth that is evident to everyone else. Have you ever felt "out of step," where other believers seem to be? Trust me, Thomas gives us great hope when we feel that way.

First, this story about Thomas shows us that Jesus and God can transcend any doubts we may have about Jesus' life, ministry, death, and resurrection. It actually gives us hope in the face of our doubts, any doubts we may have about Jesus and God working in our lives. Someone pointed out Garth Brook's song "Unanswered Prayers" one Sunday, saying my sermon brought that song to mind. It's about how we may think God isn't working within our lives because God didn't answer our prayers the way we THOUGHT God should have answered them. That's us, and probably Thomas at the beginning of our Gospel story.

Thomas had probably expected Jesus to be the Reigning King-God's anointed Messiah in the land of Israel. Instead, Thomas, like the other Disciples, saw Jesus put to death by the Roman government. His hopes for the future were probably squashed in the reality he had witnessed. Then in his time of grief and despair, others around him were Joyous and flying off the walls with Excitement and giddy happy news: Jesus is ALIVE!!

Have you ever been in Thomas' shoes of grief, and yet, others around you are cheering and happy with news you just couldn't wrap your mind around. See, I can relate to Thomas. This is why I love

our Gospel writer John. He gives me places where I can see myself living the real lives of people living in the reality of this world, moving toward an understanding that God does, and can overturn the dynamics in our lives by God's power and Kingdom.

There are two things we, who live now, in 2021 receive from this passage. Two promises that we get as believers in the Resurrection of Jesus: First, the blessing that we get when Jesus proves to Thomas he was the real Jesus, alive, with the wounds that Thomas was able to touch—Jesus pronounces: "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." We have been given a Blessing by Jesus, himself!

The second blessing or promise is the promise of peace and the Holy Spirit. When the risen Christ showed up among the Disciples he said "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit." Jesus is continually sending peace and the Holy Spirit to those who would follow him. We are recipients of what Jesus is faithful to do for his followers.

I often try to convey the truth that God and Jesus never change. Ever! When we talk about the Trinity, God, Jesus, and The Holy Spirit, we talk about how all of them are the same—what one will do, the others do, what one doesn't do, the others don't do. I've given the illustration of water, ice, and steam. But another way to look at it is the person of God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. A person can be a parent, at the same time being a brother, and at another time a great friend—all the same person, but in different roles that don't change who the person is. That's God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. We can count on all of them to do what they do in the lives of believers.

John, our Gospel writer, makes it clear why he is writing these things down for us. John writes: But these are written so that you may come to believe[b] that Jesus is the Messiah,[c] the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name. John wants us, those of us who live now, in 2021 to experience and know the power of God and Jesus, and the Holy Spirit in our lives like the Disciples and even Thomas experienced in that day when they experienced the risen Christ in their midst. John wants us to believe and be transformed by the resurrection power of God in our lives, as profoundly as they had on that unbelievable day of days.

John wants us to know that all things are possible with God, there are no limits to God's love, or grace toward us as believers. John writes so we can acknowledge the truth about our own journey of faith with its ups and downs, like the Disciples had in theirs. Even in 1 John we are encouraged to be honest about our ability to stray in our journey with God. It is by God's power we have faith, and are strengthened in our faith journey.

God's actions are always faithful and loving so we can grow in our understanding of God's power over all things in our lives. Our problem is that we, like Thomas, wrap ourselves in a protective shell that we think will safeguard us from disappointments. We want blessings, but we sometimes have an understanding of what a "blessing should look like," and we can't seem to grasp the concept of God's kingdom truths that others are trying to tell us about. And yet, we can thank Thomas—because of him we get a blessing when we attempt to believe in the risen Christ, Jesus.

You have been reminded that Jesus Christ is your Lord and that you are God's servants- you are loved -you are forgiven -and you are empowered by the Holy Spirit to live as God's faithful ones in this world.
